

Although he failed to receive a clear majority, he held a comfortable 38-vote lead over Gilbert, who polled 193 votes. Robinson

finished third with 161 votes. Winners in the race for members of the board of aldermen were W. R. Jenkins and Johnnie Vereen from the first ward; Arthur E. Huntley and Bobby Jones from the second ward; and Harry Sell and Roy Arntsen from the third ward.
