

Men Report On Nature In Raw From Ralph Varnum, Sup-

ply man who is working with the U.S. Army Engineers on a snag boat up the Northeast River comes a strange story of nature in the raw, observed while he and Earl Kirby, also of Supply, were at work recently.

Varnum says that they observed a 2-foot water rattler catch and fight a big freshwater catfish for about 10minutes, when the fish finally gave up and was carried to the bank. The men killed the snake as it reached the bank, and the fish floated away, apparently lifeless. Gradually he revived, and finally swam away. 

TIME and TIDE By JIMMIE HARPER

The time was August 18, 1987, and the topic for all citizens of Southport still was the Sailing Regatta, whose Class A trophy was won by the Geechee of Savannah, Ga. Interest in this 3-day event had been a-building for several weeks, and the Friday afternoon show more than lived up to expectations, as no less than seven boats capsized during heats run that afternoon. So, it came as an anti-climax on Saturday when there was practically no wind at all and the boats were becalmed throughout most of the afternoon. But it was a gala occasion; and a good time was had by all.

Not to be crowded out by all this excitement was news of a heroic rescue made by Johnnie Varnum, who saved four persons from drowning while he was working at a fishing camp operated that season at Holden Beach by the N. C. Prison Department.

Even the conservative headlines in the August 19, 1942, issue of The Pilot gave insistent reminders that the war was on. Mrs. L. C. Fergus was head of the Red Cross Disaster Committee; Tom Morgan was operating the projector for showing movies at the USO; a Red Cross First Aid Class had been organized; and plans were being made to use the siren for an air raid test. Mrs. J. W. Ruark was ready to go on full time duty as executive secretary for the American Red Cross in Brunswick county.
