

TIME and TIDE

It was February 16, 1938, and it was dead winter. The Pilot that week, in an attempt to warm everyone's spirits, ran a picture of three Southport lovelies (Leila Hubbard, Mercedes Watts, and Lois Jane Bussells) decked out in swimming gear, enjoying the warm water of a Ft. Caswell bath. The fame of the hot springs at the fort had been spread through the up-state newspapers, and great numbers of people were coming to enjoy the healthful, refreshing, and warm waters.

The Civic Club was still hard at work trying to invent history; the N. C. S. U. S. U. S. D. of 1812 was planning to erect a monument commemorating the American effort in the war of that date (1812); and the Riegel Paper Company was starting to restore forests with pine seedlings. A walkway was being planned for the Shallotte River bridge, which the local school children had to cross twice daily; and The Pilot had added another feature: "The Sayings of Dorcas, the Philosopher."
