



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It was June 7, 1939, and the front page of The Pilot that week carried an interesting account of the long history of the St. Phillips Church at Old Brunswick. Another news item announced that the Green Swamp was being "whittled down to size" by a Riegel Paper Co. dragline. Bill Sharpe, North Carolina's chief tub-thumper of the time, had made the prediction that the State's biggest treasure find would be made someday on Bald Head Island. (He has not yet been proved wrong). Capt. Robert Thompson had piloted the tanker Pan Massachusetts up-river to Wilmington for a new draft record of 31 feet, 5 inches; our Not Exactly newsman noted that both Calendar Newton and M. R. Sanders held unlimited licenses for marine engineering; and, while this column missed the item, a front page story mentioned that a 26-foot python had escaped from the New York World's Fair grounds.

Tom Gilbert, John D. O'Daniel, and Buster Northrop had figured heroically in a near-tragedy on the Oak Island beach; the menhaden fisherman Alert had lived up to her name, catching some 200 thousand fish between Ft. Caswell and Bald Head Island; and Ramona and Her Men Of Music were playing at the Whiteville armory.

It was June 7, 1944, D-day plus-one. The news of the Normandy invasion was out, and the editor took cognizance of the fact in a front page editorial. urging, "Now that the invasion has really come, it is important that we do not put too much stress on the significance of initial successes . . . there is a lot of fighting to come and we are going to witness the greatest Continued On Page Four
