

#### **Bowman Reports** On Disposition Of Local Bills

Rep. Returns From 1959 Session Following Adjournment Late Saturday

LOCAL B\$LLS HAVE IMPORTANT BEARING

Report Includes Pertinent Provisions Of Legislation On County Level

At or about 4 p. m. Saturday the 1959 General Assembly came to a close after a session which lasted 137 days. The clock was stopped at 3 p. m. and the session officially adojurned at that

Atotal of 1,880 bills was introduced in both houses and of this number, 1,419 were enacted into law. Most of the bills introduced concerned local legislation which applied only to the counties involved. However, a great number of bills having statewide coverage were of very far reaching importance. In this classification would fall the bills which were passed with relation to minimum wages, withholding taxes, and the motor vehicle violation point system. Probably the most important bill which failed to pass was that concerning revisions in our State Constitution, including the so-called court reform modifica-

The following is a resume of bills introduced by either Senator S. Bunn Frink or your Representative which passed and became law during this session. These bills effect Brunswick Coun-

S. B. 8 provided that the Couny Board of Education can contruct school facilities in the county of a cost up to \$25,000 without the services of an archiect or engineer thereby eliminatng these costs and permitting the board to use regular employees to perform the work. This bill was later amended by Senator Frink to increase the amount-

S. B. 22 known as the "Frink-Yow Bill" which permits the taking of oysters in Brunswick, New Hanover, and Pender Counties all year round on Tuesday and Friday of each week for one's personal use only. The amount of ovsters to be taken is limited to one bushel. In addition, the bill \*Local Funds Expended And provides that shrimp and other Home Services In Jeopar- shellfish may be taken on a year dy Unless Public Shows round basis for personal use only ed for violators of this bill.

H. B. 195 introduced by your Representative provided that the Board of County Commissioners PLIGHT OF CHAPTER may call a special election in the county on thea question of whether or not the voters of the county desire to levy an ad valorem tax not to exceed 10c per \$100 valuation to be used for the purpose of atracting new industry to the county.

H. B. 204 was introduced by your Representative which authwick county citizens may result orizes deputy sheriffs and other in shutting down all Red Cross peace officers in Brunswick County to use sirens and flashing red lights on their personal automobiles when used in the course of their official duties.
