

# TIME and TIDE

A new front page feature appeared in the June 26 edition in the year 1935. It was called "Outstanding News From Everywhere", and the keeper of the column was Miss Dorothy Bell, High Point College student, at home for the summer months. There was a front page feature, with photo, of John Wescott, identified as the last surviving Confederate veteran in Brunswick. A serious forest fire was raging in the Green Swamp, and boys from the CCC camp at Southport were helping with the roundthe-clock battle.

The Hood Building, recently purchased by Brunswick county, was being remodeled for use as county offices; threat of infantile paralysis had led to cancellation of at least two county-wide meetings, but no case had thus far been reported in Brunswick; and we received an assist from Miss Branch Phelps, our Exum correspondent, who urged public spirited people of th evarious communities to send in the news to the county newspaper.

A front page headline in our issue of June 26, 1940, announced that J. Melville Broughton the Democratic nominee for Governor, would be the speaker at the Fourth of July reunion scheduled here for members of the 2nd Trench Mortar Battalion, men who had served at Ft. Caswell during World War I. Randolph Scott, famous movie star who had been a member of this outfit, had received a special invitation to attend.

W. S. Wells had received the Democratic nomination for Register of Deeds in a second primary election on Saturday; a front page headline proclaimed: "Army Training Is Planned For Adult Citizens"; and a local lady, Mrs. L. C. Fergus, had received

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
