Prices And Volums Continue High On This Border Belt Market As Season Nears Close Next Week

Preliminary U. S. Department of Agriculture reports through the 36th day of bright leaf sales for the Border belt shows that Whiteville has sold 34,010,600 pounds of tobacco so far. The sale has been for \$21,061,155, a heavy two and a quarter millions of dollars more than last year.




