two of these, at Bilivia and Ash, with a part of the county ticket leading in the latter precinct. S. Bunn Frink was the leading vote-getter, with 4,612 votes.

This gave him a majority of 2,1-55 over his Republican opponent, The Kennedy-Johnson vote and

the vote for Terry Sanford for governor ran right along with the county ticket. The Democratic presidential candidate received 4,265 votes to 2,888 for Nixon-Lodge. Sanford received 4,220 ballots to 2.918 for Robert Gavin. Earl Bellamy polled 4,575 votes for Judge of Record's court to

2,468 for Walter Wilson, his Repubican opponent. Durwood Clark had 4,276 in his race for Register of Deeds to
