The Brunswick County Unit of the American Cancer Society will meet at the County Agriculture Building at Supply at 8 p. m. on Thursday, May 4 for its report meeting for the 1961 Cancer Crusade. Area chairmen will report the results of Crusade efforts in each section of the county.

Bill Smith, of Southport, Crusade Chairman, says: "I want to emphasize that the Crusade means more than just taking up a collection. Our first objective is to provide everyone in the county with life-saving leaflets. This is part of the society's nationwide educational program which has been largely responsible for the fact one million Americans are alive today, cured of cancer.

"Each of us has a responsibility in the fight against cancer. This responsibility can be expressed in a simple sentence of two-letter words: 'If It Is To Be, It Is Up

Public Hearing Is Scheduled On Drainage Project

Brunswick County Farmers And Farm Officials To Cooperate In Presenting Evidence Supporting Re-

The Army Corps of Engineers will hold a public hearing in Whiteville, Thursday morning at 11 a. m. in the courthouse to hear testimony on whether or not there is a need for flood controland drainage work on the Waccamaw river.

The hearing will be conducted by the Corps' Charleston District with Col. J. R. Thompson, District Engineer, presiding.

The public notice put out by the Engineers says the principal. objective of the hearing is to determine the desirability of improving the water runoff of theriver with the view of affording greater protection from floods for Conway, S. C.

An earlier report on the river dating back several years pointed out that the most feasible improvement would be a diversion flood canal from a point along the state line to the ocean, and further by removing snags and similar debris from the main river channel.

The diversion canal, it is understood, would not carry any water during the normal flow periods of the river. During floods, however, it would take a portion of the flood waters direct to the ocean, reducing thereby the volume which normally continues down the river past Con-
