Supreme Court Kills Leaf Act

The United States Supreme Court has barred enforcement of the identification provisions of a 1960 Georgia act requiring labeling of flue cured tobacco sold at auctions.

Some local leaf growers ran into the labeling of tobacco when they went to Georgia markets to sell part of their offerings in 1960. The tobacco from states other than Georgia were ticketed with a blue tag while Georgia's Type 14 was labeled with a white tag.

The white tagged leaf brought as much as \$5 to \$10 more per hundred weight than out of state tobacco. This action was highly controversial and court action was instigated.
