

The first in a series of four Ceacher Workshops planned for Brunswick county was completed Monday evening at Bolivia High School where for the past five weeks teachers representing the five consolidated schools of the county have been taking a course in "Art Appreciation".

The workshop was conducted by Miss Ruby Ball, member of the faculty at East Carolina College. It began on January 8, and met from 4 to 7:30 o'clock each Monday evening. Sixty-six persons received credit for the course, although the enrollment figure reached 77.

Among the group was one New Hanover teacher and one from Columbus county.


