Waccamaw Site For Educational Meet Wednesday

Large Crowd Attended Annual Session Of Fifth Dis-trict Of The State School **Board Association**

The annual meeting of District Five of the State School Board Association, with more than 400 educators in attendance, was held last Wednesday at the Wacca-maw High School in Ash.

The District president is C. Y. Coleman of Ash, and L. A. Burton is principal of the host school.
Supt. John G. Long said that he was "particularly proud" of the Brunswick turnout, which constituted roughly about one-third of the gathering. District Five includes six counties, plus the towns of Goldsboro, Clinton and Fremont.

The main speaker was Dr. Everett Miller, assistant state superintendent of Public Instruction. Whereas the speaker expressed conviction that N. C. education has progressed steadily, he went on to warn that much remained to be accomplished before "we can rest on our laurels."
