Miss Patricia Ann Clark Becomes Bride Of Daniel Ray Mitchell

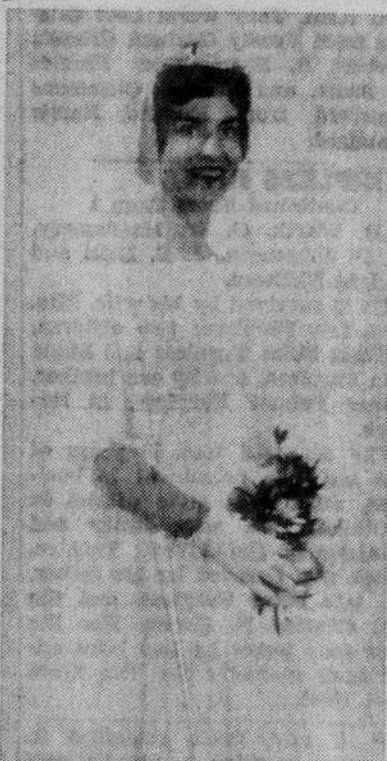
