

The ambulance driver, bringing the trio toward Whiteville spotted an auto which had left NC 130 and plunged into the deep canal just inside Columbus county. Dr. Bongardt, despite the fact he had suffered a chest injury in the earlier accident, removed his outer clothing and plunged without hesitation into the icy waters, intending to help any occupant of the submerged

Final Teachers **Workshop Comes** To Close Monday

Third In Series Of In-Service Education Program For Brunswick County Teachers Highly Success-

The third in a series of three special In-Service Teacher Education Workshops to be held this year in Brunswick county came to a close Monday evening. This course, which met from 7 to 9:30 o'clock each Monday evening for the past 5 weeks, was "Geography Of World Problems", and was taught by Dr. Charles Gritxned, member of the faculty at East Carolina College.

Teachers and principals from each of the five consolidated schools have participated in these workshops for a total attendance of 163, involving 104 individuals. This means that some of the teachers attended more than one workshop session.

It is planned that this program will be continued during the 1962-63 school term.

In the "B" Budget for 1961-63, the State Board of Education requested funds in the amount of \$150,000 annually to provide for the professional improvement of teaching in the

The General Assembly provided funds in the amount of \$300,000 for the biennium for purpose of developing and carrying out a State-wide program of in-service education for teachers.

The basic objective of the program is to modernize the contest and up-grade the teaching in the various areas of the curriculum. Recognizing that the achievement of this objective depends to a great degree upon the Coroner L. B.
