

Parents Live Here—

Jeanne Mitchell In Concert

Prior to her recent concert in Philadelphia with the Philadelphia Symphony Orchestra, Miss Jeanne Mitchell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph S. Mitchell of Southport, received the following write-up in The Philadelphia Inquirer: "A beautiful violinist, Jeanne Mitchell, will be the soloist with Eugene Ormandy and the Philadelphia Orchestra at the Academy of Music Friday and Saturday.

She will play the Master's only Violin Concerto, in the third and final concert of this year's Beethoven cycle.

"In private life the wife of New York music critic Louis Biancolli, Miss Mitchell made her local debut at the Music Festival of the Philadelphia Inquirer Charities in June, 1949, appearing before an audience of 80,000 in the Municipal Stadium.

"Miss Mitchell has not appeared with the Philadelphia Orchestra in the Academy since her debut in the 1954-55 season. She was scheduled for concerts in 1959, but instead took a year's maternity leave of absence from her career.

"The soloist, an extremely attractive and gifted ash blonde,

still in her 30s, was born in Wilmington, N. C. At the age of five her parents moved to New York and she started to study violin when she was eight. At 10, Miss Mitchell made her first appearance in a school recital.

"There is a family story to the effect that, flushed with the applause of her first offering, the young fiddler calmly announced to the audience, 'I will now play five encores'—and proceeded to do so. All five were little compositions of her own.

"Miss Mitchell was graduated at the age of 19 from Columbia University's Barnard College. Two years later she made her recital debut in New York's Town Hall. During the past 15 years, she has appeared with the leading orchestras of the United States and has toured extensively, in recitals, in this country and in Latin America.

"She is not only among the leading violinists of the day of

either sex, and an accomplished pianist, but a talented sculptor and painter.

"In 1960, she received the Medal for Excellence of Columbia University by way of acknowledging that "music has been made more understandable because of her artistry."

Following are excerpts from the review in The Inquirer following her triumphant appearance with the Philadelphia Orchestra:

"Eugene Ormandy and the Philadelphia Orchestra presented the third and last of this season's all Beethoven programs in the Academy of Music on Friday afternoon. Star of the occasion was Jeanne Mitchell as soloist in the immortal Ludwig's only violin concerto.

"Miss Mitchell is a fine artist. Blonde, strikingly handsome, and wearing a becoming concert gown of pale green, she gave a most gratifying account of Beethoven's familiar masterpiece.

"Her tone is not large but it is luminously elastic and silvery in quality. She has a beautifully free bow arm and a well disciplined left hand. Technically, Miss Mitchell is quite brilliant; and if her performance lacked somewhat in fire and grandeur, it is stoned to a great extent by good taste and sound musicianship.

"Not the least of her triumphs were her gallant and impressively facile dealings with the difficult Kreisler cadenzas. The audience awarded her a sustained ovation."

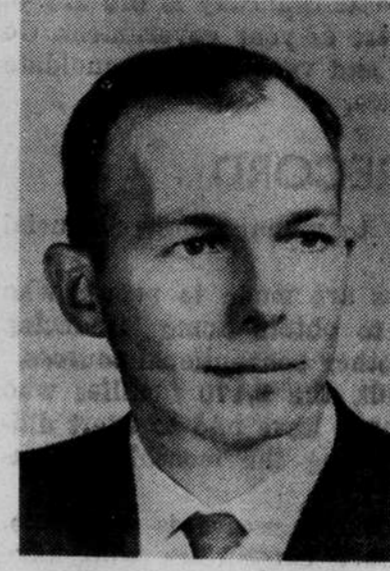

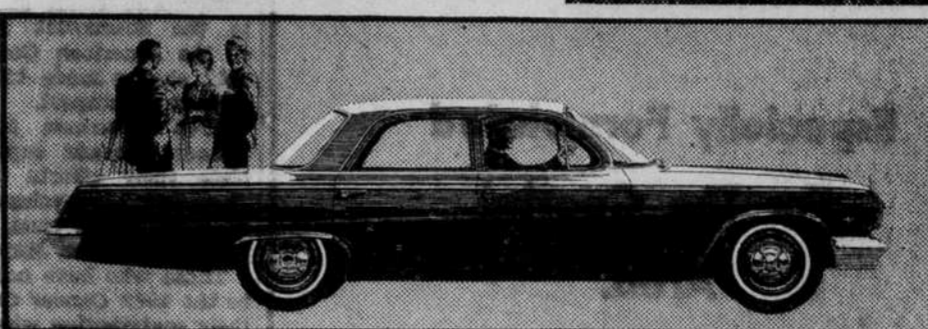
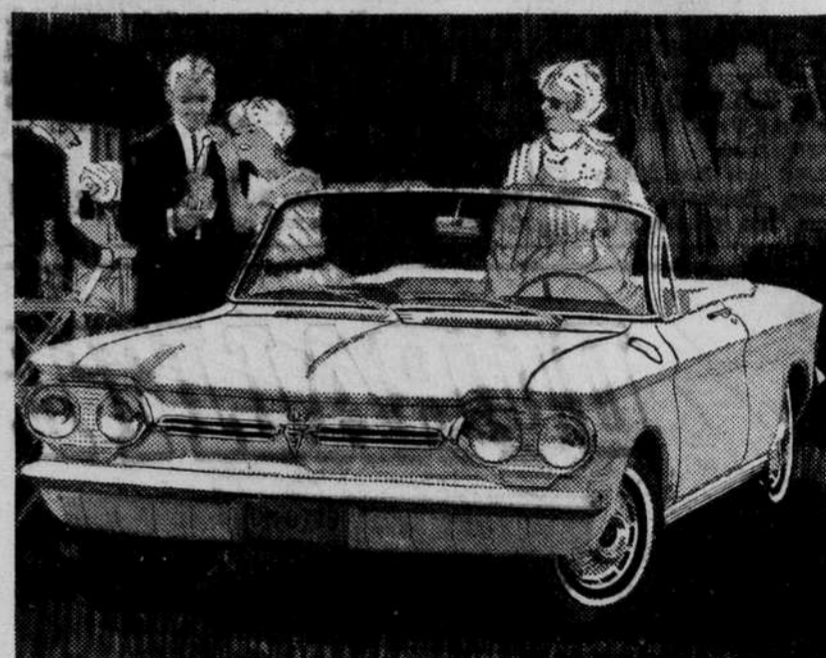
