A new superintendent of Brunswick County Schools was appointed Thursday night by the Brunswick County Board of Education but he resigned Saturday. Another attempt to fill the vacancy will be made at a meeting set for

Lewis S. Cannon, superintendent of Pinehurst City Schools. was interviewed and was approved by the board Thursday. He signed a contract to be the superintendent of schools in Brunswick county for the next two years. Cannon informed the Board

Saturday that he could not accept the job. He said the Pinehurst School Board had given him a substancial raise in salary, and he could not turn it down.

In addition to Cannon, two other men were interviewed for the job Thursday.

The board will meet again Friday at 7:30 p. m. to interview more applicants.
