Prominent Southport Citizes Died Tuesday Morning At Burial At Arlington

Colonel Earl Ivan Brown, 88 Southport resident and long-time member of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, died Tuesday morn-ing at Friendly Rest Home in Durham.

A native of Carrolton, Ga., he was the son of the late William F. and Priscilla Hagen Brown. He was a graduate of the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, in 1898, after completing his secondary education in the Carrolton schools.

Five years ago this week the renovation of the garrison house of Ft. Johnson was started, with plans calling for the original lines to be preserved and no major structural changes to be made. The building upon completion was to be the quarters of the commanding officer of the Sunny Point Army Terminal. Modernization was expected to be completed within four months after the job was begun on the historic landmark overlooking the Cape Fear river.

The Southport Charter Boatmens Association was host to the North Carolina Outdoor Writers Association's annual convention, with a banquet given in their honor at the Long Beach entertainment center.

Ten years ago this week another rush of sailfish highlighted the week's catches of gamefish. It was notable that sailfish were brought in three consecutive days, with a 13 year old Winston-Salem youth being one of the lucky anglers.

The Southport Fisheries suffered losses estimated at \$12,000 when vandals tossed acid on the netting of their huge nets. Damage was suffered on two of the company's boats, and involved the roping and netting. The nets cost \$7,000 each when new. Even the heavy ropes used to lower the purse boats were eaten away, causing the smaller craft to plunge overboard.

Large catches of shrimp promised the boats recently returned from Florida a most successful season of the Cape Fear coast. The shrimp, still small, were expected to grow and be of desirable size within a few weeks.
