



## Shallotte Vote **Favors Sale Of Bonds For Water**

All The Time

Authorization For Sale Of \$121,000 Water Bonds Will Qualify Municipality For Federal Grant

Shallotte citizens overwhelmingly approved the town's first bond sue to establish a central water system by a vote of nearly four to one Saturday.

"I am proud of my people, Mayor Roney Cheers said. "This is the best news this town has received in years."

Shallotte voted 134 to 31 in favor of the \$121,000 bond issue that insures the town of receiving a \$117,-000 federal grant which had been approved last month pending the ome of the Saturday bond election.

A total of 165 of the town's 200 registered voters went to the polls during the day, setting a voting record for the Brunswick County nunicipality.

Mayor Cheers said the town commissioners would begin work immediately on final plans for the water system which will serve some 200 families and several businesses and industries.

He said the engineering firm of Boney and Newcomb of Raleigh, which has been hired by the town, will begin developing final plans for the water system as quickly as possible
