Mayor Eugene B. Tomlinson read a letter from Ronald N. Hood resigning as alderman to enlist in the Army. Hood said he had enjoyed his terms on the board and offered to help the city in any way he could. Fred Spencer moved that the resignation be accepted, Harold Aldridge seconded and the
