One Brunswick County school administrator returned to the classroom this fall to expand her management and leadership skills with new information in areas such as University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

Sue Sellers, principal of South Brunswick High School, was among 32 principals and superintendents at the Institute of Government. When they completed the 25-day program October 8, the principals were considered to be more effective school leaders.

The course requires participants to complete 160 hours of classroom work during four months. Besides law and curriculum, other major areas of study include personnel management, communications, selfknowledge, technology and personal development.

Participants must read, complete study guides and discuss the contents of 13 books, 80 articles and 30 case studies assigned by the 61 faculty members. They also must write papers on their educational philosophy and school leadership. Each
