In view of the important bearing of the acreage devoted to cotton upon prices of this staple, unusual interest is felt in the size of the crop planted. The result given below is carefully com piled from reports of a large number of regular correspondents, and is believed to be approximately correct. An inter esting feature of the report is the difference between the estimated acreage of all cotton counties and of a dozer of the largest cotton counties, repre sentative of the different sections.
