Town Ordinance, Fire Limit. Be it enacted by the Board of Town Commissioners for the town of Asheboro, N. C. in a regular called session, all the members being present and concurring herein: That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to erect, establish, cover, alter or repair any wooden or corrugated iron building or structure within the following described and prescribed fire limits in the town of Asheboro, without having first obtained the written consent of the Mayor upon the order of the Board of Town Commissioners assembled in regular or called meeting: Said limit beginning at a stake at a point even with the east side of the Presbyterian church building, and the south side of W. H. Moring's residence, and running thence west to Church street; thence in a northerly direction along the east side of Church street to a stake at a point even with the north end of the brick storehouse now owned and occupied by the McCrary-Redding Hardware Co.; thence east passing along the north end of the McCrary-Redding Hardware Company's brick store house to a stake at a point even with the east side of the Presbyterian church building; thence south to the beginning.

Any person, firm or corporation violating this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined fifty dollars. Any person, firm or corporation allowing any such work to continue or building or structure to remain after having been notified by the mayor shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined ten dollars for each day said work continues or building or structure remains thereafter. This ordinance shall be in effect from and after noon of the 16th day of January, 1906. Done by order of the Board this 16th day of Jan. 1906. M. C. SPOON, Mayor. Acting Clerk, E. MOFFITT.
