THE DISTRICT CONFERENCE.

Owing to press of other matter we did not give a report of the Greensboro District Conference of the M. E. church, South, which convened here last week. The conference met Tuesday morning, July 24, and was opened with devotional exercises by the presiding elder, S. B. Turentine. Rev. C. A. Wood, of Ramseur was elected secretary. Twenty of the twenty one charges in the district were represented. Committees were appointed on temperance, spiritual state of the church, missions &c. Dr. Turentine's report showed progress on all lines and made many timely suggestions. Rev. A. W. Plyler, who at one time was in charge of the church in this place, preached an able and scholarly sermon. At eleven o'clock Rev. H. M. Blair addressed the conference in the interest of the Christian Advocate. At night Rev. P. J. Caraway preached a typical Methodist sermon—full of fire and old time religion. At the Wednesday morning session Rev. Thos. H. Law, agent of the American Bible Society, spoke of the spread of the word of God throughout the world. At eleven o'clock Rev. A. S. Roper, of Greensboro, preached an able sermon. The afternoon session was devoted to missions and several made short addresses. It developed during the discussion that Greensboro district paid 117 per cent on missionary claims, which is certainly a good showing. At night Dr. Detwiler preached a powerful sermon to a large congregation. The report of the committee on education was the first thing Friday morning and was quite interesting. Prof. Harvey, of Trinity High School, spoke of that institution and said it was prospering and enlarging its scope and that its curriculum was now the same as Trinity Park at Durham. Twelve hundred dollars were raised and forty scholarships will be established. It is hoped to place that institution on a strong basis—something like it was before the removal of the college to Durham. The report from Trinity College, at Durham, showed it to be growing and prosperous, with 489 students in all departments, and in every way fulfilling President Roosevelt's declaration when he said at Trinity: "You stand for all those things for which a scholar must stand if he is to render real and lasting service to the state."

The reports of the several committees were read and adopted. Mrs. T. J. Copeland, of Greensboro, addressed the conference in behalf of the Womens Home Missionary Society and dealt with the work of this important branch of church work.

The following laymen were elected delegates to the next annual conference, at Mt. Airy, in November: P. H. Morris, P. H. Williams, C. H. Ireland, W. G. Bradshaw. Alternates: C. E. Landreth, J. P. Redding.

Rev. T. F. Marr, of High Point, preached a very impressive sermon at 11 o'clock. After some discussion Liberty was chosen as the place of holding the next district conference.

The conference was well attended and much important business was transacted.
