Hon. Robert M. Douglas, who was nominated for corporation commissioner by acclamation at the Republican State convention held at Greensboro July 10th, 1906, has written an open letter to the people of North Carolina which we take pleasure in laying before our readers. We are compelled to print a supplement containing this address, together with other matter omitted from the regular issue for want of space. Every reader of the Bulletin should study this address carefully, as it contains much information of general interest to the public.

It is a pleasure to note that so far, no personal bitterness has been engendered in the campaign in Randolph. This is as it should be. Men who claim the right to think and act for themselves, should allow other people to do likewise.

North Carolina is enjoying the greatest era of material prosperity in her history—not by reason of a democratic state administration, but in sympathy with, and by reason of the great wave of prosperity which followed immediately after the republicans under McKinley took charge of the national administration.

And now they say that cotton sold at a higher price under Cleveland's administration than under McKinley. The next boast of the democrats will be that soup under the last Cleveland administration become so thin in quality and high in price that none but Coxe's army soldiers could afford that luxury on their tables—the plutocrats and trust magnates had to be content with just plain, sherry or old Port.

They have tried to enthrone 'em, but they won't enthrone. First, they tried Simmons pudding, then Page pumpkin seed pie, and then Sams salad, and still they would not use, and now they are going to Overman barbecued veal, Pot (Pue) mutton, and repeat Page pumpkin seed pie, and if that don't enthrone 'em, the next prescription will be a hyperdermic injection of nigger soup by Dr. Glenn, and last but not least, the never-failing remedy, a plaster of "long green" applied to the tender conscience of the "float-er."

Who paid \$282.30 interest on Randolph County orders to the amount of \$3900? Democratic commissioners. When did this occur? In May and July 1896. To whom was this interest paid? To a member of the same democratic board which paid the orders.

The Autumn leaves and fall crop of candidates will ripen about the same time.

If you are a republican, you have to run after the registrar before you can register your name. If you are a democrat, the registrar will run after you to get you to register.

What has R. N. Page done during his four years in congress? He has drawn \$20,000 and mileage from the United States government and, and—words fail us to express the rest.

If these facts and figures don't convince you, we've got others.

As the joint canvass progresses, it becomes more and more evident that this time-honored institution should be cut out—discontinue—relegated to the rear. Several of the candidates have been unable to follow up the appointments on account of the sickness of themselves or families, others are put to a great deal of inconvenience and all who have weathered the storm and met their engagements have done so at the peril of their health. It is doubtful whether the entire canvass will change a dozen votes. Cut it out.

Did Republican commissioners ever pay interest on Randolph County orders? Never! Did Republican commissioners ever have a judgment recorded against Randolph County? Never! Did the Democratic commissioners ever have judgments recorded against them, if so, for how much? Yes, judgments to the amount of \$4859.15 were recorded against democratic commissioners and \$3882.62 of this amount was paid by Republican commissioners.

The democrats are going before the people on their record. They are boasting on the stump and through their newspaper organ that county orders were always worth face value under democratic boards of commissioners. Let those who believe these statements turn to the county records of 1896 and examine order No. 2146, drawn May 4th, and order No. 2346, drawn July 6. The first is an order for \$144.00 allowed for two years interest on county orders to the amount of \$1200, and the second is an order for \$138.30, balance of interest on county orders to the amount of \$2700. This money was taken from the tax payer and paid by a democratic board of commissioners to one of its members. Did republican commissioners ever conduct county affairs in this way?

"Make Marion Butler the issue," comes the order from Simmons to democratic speakers and newspapers, and accordingly thousands of sheets of abuse are turned out daily and weekly by the press and the spell-binders vie with each other in seeing who can coin the greatest number and most abusive epithets and hurl them against this man whom they have set out to destroy. Meanwhile Butler is calm and serene and never misses an opportunity to deal the democratic party the hard blows which he alone is capable of administering. Butler has been so soundly abused by the Simmons gang that he is growing in favor every day.

Why should any one vote for Burrow and English in preference to Wood and Foushee? Both Burrow and English were formerly Democrats and said meaner things about the Republicans than were ever said by either Wood or Foushee.—Ashboro Courier.

The fact that Burrows and English were formerly democrats and forsook that kaleidoscopic party and joined the party of progress and fixed principles is one very great reason why the voters should support them at the polls. Progressive, intelligent men change when they know they are in error. Men of deep seated prejudice, fools and dotes never change. Another great reason for sending Burrows and English to the legislature is the eminent fitness of the men for the office. In this case the office sought the men.

The Republican party and the members composing it are inclined to a spirit of fairness toward a political enemy—never strike below the belt or thrust a man when he is down. This spirit of fairness was exemplified by Prof. N. C. English at Farmer last week when he would not consent to take part in the joint debate because his opponent, Col. Wood, was not present to defend himself. This spirit of magnanimity on the part of Prof. English is commendable indeed. But mark how his political foe returned evil for good. Last Monday Prof. English could not be present at the appointment in Union township, and it would have been an act of common courtesy for his opponent not to join in the discussions. Did he return the courtesy? Not a bit of it. The representative of Col. Wood, who was none other than J. M. Way, (Supt. of public instruction) went right on and made his speech, Way and Foushee consuming 50 minutes and gave Burrow only 25 minutes. Was this fair treatment?

Frazier and the clerk of the board were requested by the board of the county commissioners to get up the indebtedness of Randolph county; and the following is a report made by T. C. Millikan, R. W. Frazier and the clerk: They find Randolph county's indebtedness Dec. 3, 1894 was \$11,302.70.

Since the Democrats have had charge of the State Government the Indebtedness of the State has increased \$283,000, and the interest on this indebtedness, to say nothing of the principal, is \$32,800 a year.

The Auditor's report shows that the expenses of the State last year were \$2,563,018.80 and our receipts for the same year only \$2,509,896.30, Showing that they spent \$53,122.50 more than was received.

To accept Mr. Bryan's new propaganda of paternalism or Mr. Hearst's socialism, or to supinely accept whatever the Taggarts and Murphys prepare for us is to deserve ruin, is to welcome ruin, is to forfeit self respect, is to invite men with blood in their veins to walk out. ## Lawlessness Under Democratic Rule.

Appeal to the People of North Carolina to Erect Heroic Bronze Statue to Perpetuate His Memory.

To the People of North Carolina: Dr. Charles D. McIver devoted his life to the services of his people. No man of our day has rendered greater and more lasting service. Moved by love of his people and consciousness of his mission and duty, at great financial sacrifice, he rejected tempting offers from time to time to leave the State and to enter the commercial world at home.

His life stands out perhaps the highest ideal in this generation of North Carolinians of unselfish civic service. We believe that the people, whom he served in so many ways with so much fidelity and love, will deem it a privilege and an honor to contribute to a fund for the erection of an heroic bronze statue to perpetuate his memory.
