### Writ of Error Granted Thaw.

Philadelphia, Special .- A writ of error was granted Harry K. Thaw by United States Circuit Court of Appeals on an appeal from the decision of Judge Young at Pittsburg in which the court dismissed the writ of habeas corpus to bring Thaw to Pittsburg to testify in bankruptey proceedings.
