QUICK RECOVERY AFTER PANIC.

High authorities have never quite agreed as to the severity of the financial crisis of 1907, tested by the similar business conclusions of other years, especially 1893 and 1873. Some have maintained that the strain was more severe two years ago than it ever was before, but the majority of those who have passed judgement on the question hold that the panic of 1907 was less serious than the crashes in 1857, 1873 and 1893. All have agreed that several marked differences had to be taken into account, and that comparisons were not in all respects easy.

But now there is no room for doubt as to the state of things less than two years after the panic. The recovery in trade and industry and in the security, markets and resources and business of the banks is more advanced than it was twice as far from the crisis in 1893 or the earlier financial convulsion in 1873. Six years, in the later case, and five years in the depression following the panic of 1893, did not bring such record breaking prices for some important securities as has been scored within the last few weeks. Nor was there such a demand for labor, three times as far from the crisis of 1893, as there is now.

By the test of the labor market the panic of 1907 was not nearly so long and difficult to recover from as either of the two great business convulsions which are most often compared with it. Weighed by its effects upon the wage-earners it was relatively short and easy to endure, and that after all, is about the best test which can be applied. The recovery of trade and productive industries from the depression into which the panic plunged the country has lately become remarkably swift and complete, and the workers are reaping their share of the benefits.

Pasture Necessary.

Wheresoever situated no farmer is rightly prepared to raise hogs profitably in any considerable numbers unless well provided with pasture and grass or facilities for providing acceptable substitutes. In the economical growing of pork there is no more important factor to be considered than that of pasture. Range in pasture affords growing animals the exercise so necessary to health and proper development; and the succulent grasses, while rich in muscle and bone forming materials, tend to prevent disease and to counteract the heating and fever-imparting properties of corn. This latter quality, and exercise, annually save many thousands of dollars to hog-raisers in the United States, yet the loss that results every day to farmers who do not act upon the fact that the hog is in his normal condition, a ranging and grass-eating animal, is still enormous.—Swine in America.
