## BAPTISTS TO MEET IN CAPITAL CITY

### State Convention to Be Held in Raleigh Beginning December 8.

Dr. C. H. Durham, pastor of Brown Memorial church, of Winston-Salem, is president of the Baptist State convention, which will be called to order in the First Baptist church in Raleigh December 8.

The Times says: "The conventions that have met here so far this year were: Diocese of North Carolina, May 19; Rejuvenated Sons of Jove, May 15 and 16; Baptist Young People's Union, June 8-11; North Carolina Bankers' Association May 14-15; North Carolina Board of Pharmacy, June 9; North Carolina Medical Examining Society, June 16-18; Confederate Reunion, June 9-10; North Carolina Health Officers, June 15; Democratic State Convention, June 4; Hardware Dealers of the Carolinas, July 5-9; National Medical Society (colored), August 25-27; United Daughters of the Confederacy October 14-17; North Carolina Osteopathic Society, July 3-4.

### One of the Biggest.

"The Baptist convention will be one of the biggest from many standpoints held here this year. There will be an attendance of nearly 1,000 visitors, if all plans move along well. The program is being prepared by the committee for that purpose, and on it will appear the names of some of the ablest men in North Carolina. The Baptists of Raleigh are busily engaged arranging to entertain the visitors. There are committees from the several churches. They will have the entertainment of the messengers in hand.

During the convention many matters of interest will be discussed. While the convention has no power over any individual church or congregation, each one adhering to the right of local self government, the convention will have in hand the matter of making appropriations and appointments for missions and other benevolent objects. The messengers will be from the ranks of both the clergy and laity."

## Two Montgomery Stills Are Broken Up.

Revenue officers last Saturday broke up two stills in Eldorado township in Montgomery county. The worms had been carried away before the officers arrived but 100 gallons of beer was found and destroyed at one place and 50 gallons at another. The fermentors and other parts of the still were destroyed. No arrests were made.

#### War in Randolph

## RAMSEUR HAD BIG FIRE SUNDAY NIGHT

### The Watkins-Leonard Hardware and Ramseur Pharmacy Were Burned.

Last night about midnight fire was discovered in the upper story of the Watkins-Leonard building at Ramseur, and before the alarm could be given the building was almost a solid mass of flames. The Watkins-Leonard Hardware Company and the Marsh Pharmacy were burned to the ground. The loss is about \$15,000 with \$8,000 insurance for the hardware store, while the Ramseur Pharmacy carried \$1,000 insurance on their \$2,500 stock.

The burned structure was one of the best buildings in the town and is located right in the center of the business section and that other buildings did not burn seems but a miracle. The big glass windows in the Bank of Ramseur were broken by the heat and the hotel just across the street was scorched and for a while it looked as though the fire would sweep the business section.

A hose connection from the mill of the Columbia Manufacturing Company saved the day and although the burned building is practically surrounded by wooden buildings the fire was confined to its origination.

Mr. E. B. Leonard, the manager of the Watkins-Leonard Hardware Company stated to The Bulletin man that the building would be reconstructed as early as the debris could be removed and new material placed on the ground.

## AMERICAN FOOD SERVED BELGIANS

### Rich Pay Five Cents for Each Meal Which Cost Fifteen.

Provisions sent to Brussels by the American Commission for the relief of Belgium already are supplying 400,000 meals daily and plans are incomplete for carrying on a similar work throughout that part of Belgium occupied by the Germans. The Dutch steamer Jan-Block is sail tonight with 2,000 tons of food and the steamer Tellus is expected to leave tomorrow with 1,700 tons of wheat.

Herbert Clark Hoover, chairman of the American Commission today received the following telegram from Capt. T. F. Lucey the commission's representative at Rotterdam: "Langhorns, Wyman and Bell (Morris) Legation to The Netherlands and Luxembourg, E. M. Wyman, member of the relief commission and Edward Bell, second secretary of the American Embassy at London) have returned from Brussels where 400,000 meals a day are being issued. People able to pay are charged five cents for the meals. The meal cost 15 cents and I tell says that rich and poor stand in line as it is the only way they can get food."

## WILKES OFFICIAL VOTE.

### Amendments Badly Beaten—Republican Majority 1,100.

Wilkes county defeated the proposed taxation amendment to the constitution by a majority of 1,518 and all other proposed amendments by about the same majorities. The official vote in the county follows: Overman, 1,634; Whitener, 2,811; Travis, 1,635; Parsons, 2,814; Democratic judges, 1,638; Republican judges, 2,814; Page, 1,638; McCrary, 2,778.

## Livestock in Davidson.

The Davidson county livestock show held at Lexington Saturday drew a tremendous crowd. The exhibits were numerous and of a very high class. Draft horses and driving horses made up the largest classes. Professor Salisbury, animal husbandry expert of the North Carolina A. & M. college was the judge. Bion H. Butler of Raeford made the principal address. The premium list aggregated \$620. A big parade preceded the exercises and closing feature was an old fashioned tournament.

Reports from Richland township says that the Republicans and several Democrats are coming to Asheboro on next Saturday in a solid delegation to participate in the indignation meeting.

## THE ELECTION CONTEST.

### Messrs. Bynum, Holton and Sapp Have Been Retained by Republicans.

Nothing is being left undone and no stone is unturned in the effort to bring to early justice every man connected with frauds and trickery in the recent elections, and already the Republicans have retained Judge W. P. Bynum and O. L. Sapp of Greensboro, and Hon. A. E. Holton, of Winston-Salem, as attorneys in the case. This is perhaps the ablest counsel in the State.

New instances of fraud are being unearthed every day. There seems to be no end to the fraudulent methods used by the Democrats in the recent elections. Even good, honest Democrats have no idea of the actual methods practiced, and many of them have taken sides with the Republicans and will use their influence toward the prosecution of criminals and for cleaner elections in this county.

Republicans are stirred as never before and 2,000 will come to Asheboro to voice their protest against the methods practiced in the election of Tuesday, last.

## DAVIDSON REPUBLICANS ARE "UP AGAINST IT"

### Face Practically the Same Situation As The Republicans in Randolph

Verily Democratic rule in close counties is severe, and there is no relief for the Republicans outside the courts and it remains to be seen what they can get there. In Davidson county the elections are as close as in this county and it seems that the Republicans there are up against it. At the meeting of the board of canvassers at Lexington on last Thursday the Republican candidate for clerk of the Superior Court was counted out by two majority by throwing out the box in South Thomasville precinct, in which was the majority of the Republican clerk.

It appears that on account of trouble between the poll holders the polls were not opened until nearly 11 o'clock and when the election board met they declared that the election was illegal on these grounds and the returns were not counted, thus electing C. E. Goodwin the Democratic candidate for clerk of the Superior court.

A suit will be entered by the Republicans contesting the election and it is understood that already strong counsel has been employed.

## War Just Started.
