Hon. E. J. Justice, former Speak-er of the House, was in Raleigh re-cently attending the Supreme Court. He was gratified, as are all other Democrata, over the big victory won, and believes the Democrats will use it to hip the people. He sees, however that certain interests will now try to induce Democratic leaders to adapt a do-nothing policy, and he sees danger if such a course should be adopted. Speaking of the election and the future, Mr. Justice said:

"The result of the election is peculiarly gratifying to me. The leason to be learned from it is plain. The people took sufficient interest in politics to begin to understand that a very few very rich men in this country have been running the government through stand-pat Republicans, and their action was a protest against the continuation of this turough any party.

"The Democratic party must now keep itself free from the influence of the interests that have so long dominated the depublican party. These interests understand they cannot control the real insurgent lepublicant of the West, and they also took

Following is the cost of growing the corn:

Breaking two acres, \$ 4 00 Harrowing. 1 00 1 50 2 00 Seed corn. 9 50 3 75 10 00 Shucking corn, Gathering folder, Pulling and hauling corn, 2 50 5 00

1400 bundles of fodder, Shucks, 140 bushels corn raised.
