The opposition to good roads say, yes but these things cost money, so they do and so does anything that's may account. I am fully sware of the fact that money does not grow on trees yet I trust I many never live to see the day, when I will op-pose paying the small pittance that would be required of me to work the roads and better educate the chi-dren of my community.
