ROWAN MEN IN CONGRESS.

Through the courtesy of Post-m ster James H. Ramsey the Post is able to furnish the following very interesting information in regard to the number of men Rowan furnish-

ed to Congress : Owing to the refunal of the North Carolina convention in 1788 to ratify the Federal constitution, the State was not represented in Consion came to an end September 27, 1789. In the same year, on November 21st, North Carolina ratified the Federal constitution.

Montford Stokes was for a number of years clerk of Rowan Superithat county. In 1882 he moved to Chatham or Court and clerk of the Senate, county and lived there 23 years; then to where he enjoyed such popularity as Randolph, where he lived for five years, then to Randolph, where he lived for five years, to be elected Senator in Congress, His first wife died in 1894, and in 1895 he which at that time he declined. Rowan came very near having three senators, but our present Sen-ator, the Hon. Lee Slater Overman, who is now serving his second term, is the only man since the govern-ment was established who has filled this much-sought-after and elevated position.

Rowan and Craven stand even and rank first in the State in the number of Congressmen furnished. Rowan has sent 14 of her sons to the national House of Representa-tives and two to the Confederate,
