Whitney Plant Sold

The partially completed hydro-electric plant of the North Carolina Electric and Power company, successors of the old Whitney company, has been purchased by a French company and with the plant go houses and a portion of the land at Whitney. The purchase price is \$750,000 in cash and \$500,000 in stock of the Southern Aluminum company which latter company will be organized with a capital stock of \$8,000,000. They will build aluminum works and utilize for this enterprise the uncompleted Whitney hydro-electric development. The old Whitney company expended more than \$1,000,000 for its purchases and the development of its plant before it went into the hands of the North Carolina Electric and Power company. This company retains 7,300 acres of land in Whitney and along the Yadkin river, also gold mine and quarry property in this section and lands in Virginia.
