A native of Virginia, Col. Hicks, came to North Carolina in 1850 and spent more than sixty years of his life in service to the state of his adoption. For a quarter of a century he was the greatest contractor and builder of his generation. Railroads built by the State, the penitentiary, Governor's Mansion, and many other buildings in Raleigh are monuments to his genius. However, the crowning glory of his life was his inestimable service to the fatherless little ones, as superintendent of Oxford Orphan Asylum.

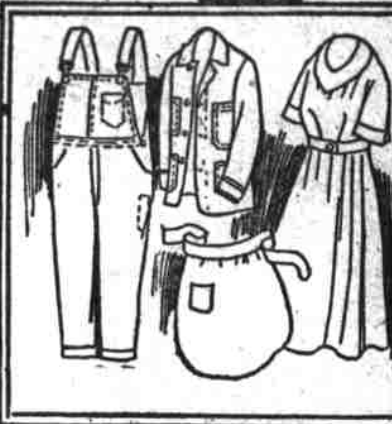

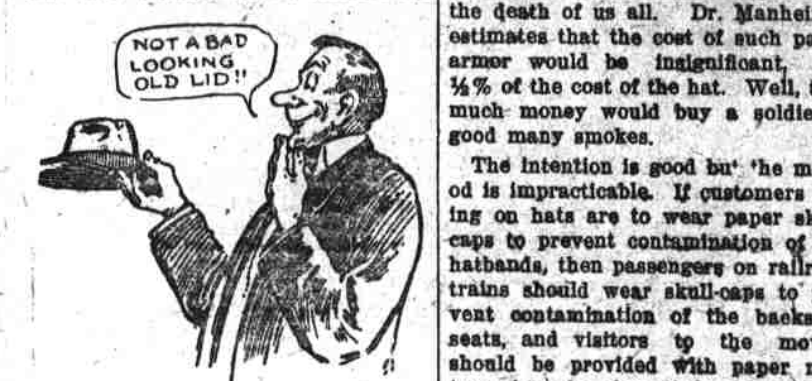

On Filing Your Old Slouch Hat

War time retrenchment and economy, if it is anything better than mere hot air, ought to relieve a certain well-known and none too valorous sex of at least one of the white man's burdens, namely, the necessity of obeying the hat man's whistle. When a hat man needs some ready money he fills his show window with a horrible ex-

Inhibit of bad taste and announces that on such and such a date the old hat will have to be flea away and a new one bought if you don't want to be considered a plain piker. This announcement never fails to bring flocks of poor, hard-working men to the store for new lids, and the price is always, for some reason or other, a little higher than last season. The old lid, mind you, has just begun to be comfortable and friendly, not at all frayed or decrepit; but its rim is one-sixteenth inch too wide or narrow, so it must be filed away, the hat man insists. We must give the fair sex credit for one thing in connection with millinery; they do exercise some individual

choice in the matter, whereas the ugly sex obeys the hatter's injunctions to the letter.

Dr. W. A. Manheimer, secretary of the American Association for Promoting Hygiene and Public Baths (hygiene, you understand, being a distinct entity), advocated, in a recent contribution to the Medical Record, the adoption of paper skullcaps by hatters, the skullcaps to be worn, not by the hatters but by customers trying on hats, as a protection against the conveyance of disease from one scalp to another via the hatter's hands. The intention is good but the method is impracticable. If customers trying on hats are to wear paper skullcaps to prevent contamination of the hatter's hands, then passengers on railroad trains should wear skullcaps to prevent contamination of the backs of seats, and visitors to the movies should be provided with paper mits to protect the arms of the chairs from contamination with all sorts of infection—all hands being more or less bathed with saliva.

There is just one real danger in trying on hats, to our rather crude imagination. The danger is visible to the naked eye—lice.

According to Dr. Manheimer, clerk in some of the high class hatteries of millineries or palaces of wholly graft confessed that now and then they have noticed live ones ensconced in the very latest fall creations.

All of which is a good argument in favor of not filing the old lid this year, but rather preserving it for reference, at least until the cop on your beat begins to watch you as a suspicious character. Cling to it for dear life until another season rolls around, and with the money saved make a deposit toward your Third Liberty Bond.
