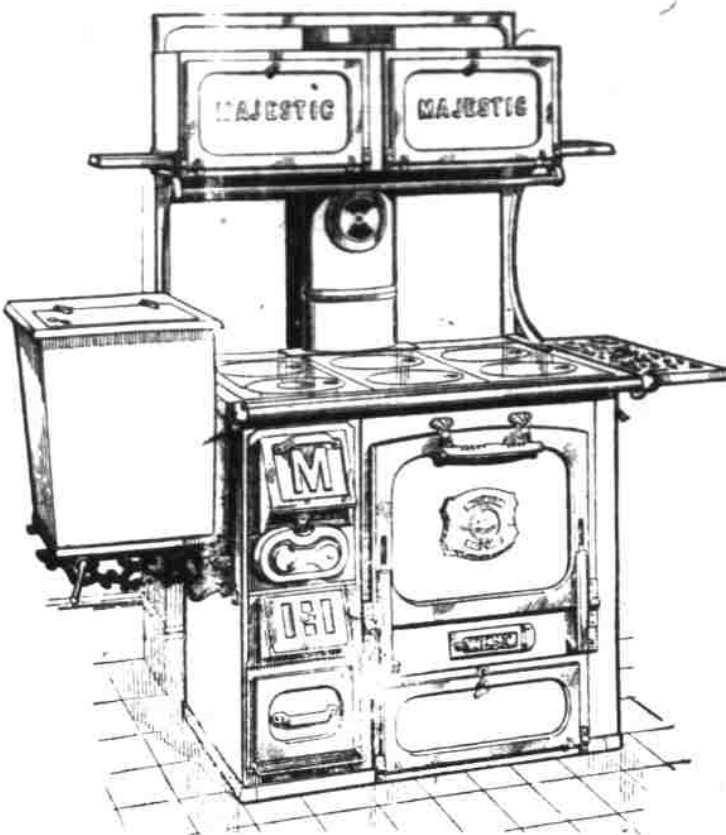

REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH

The 9 counties co-operating with the State Board of Health through the establishment of county health departments with whole time officers in charge come forward with the best report for the past month yet achieved in this work, which has shown steady progress. A total of 14,502 people were vaccinated in the campaign against typhoid fever, and in the same period a total of 969 sanitary closets were built, these being for the most part in the rural sections of the counties. These two items are merely the high spots in the work accomplished.

The educational work along health lines in these counties are summed in the following statistics: 113 public meetings held; attendance upon these meetings, 11,485; letters sent out, 2,857; newspaper articles on public health matters published, 157.

The result attained through energetic health measures is graphically shown in the report of communicable diseases for the month. While the counties in question are among the most populous in the State, yet the incidence of preventable disease was extremely low as compared with other counties where such work had not been done. Here are the figures: typhoid fever 76, diphtheria 2, whooping cough 124, scarlet fever 1, smallpox 3, total 252.

On the other hand, judging from the teachings of a long past, we must expect the pneumonia death rate for this winter to be exceptionally high. In the epidemic of 1899 to 1892, we find that while that epidemic stopped in the year 1892, the pneumonia death rate in 1893, the year following the epidemic, was unusually high.

"The October Health Bulletin, to be issued about October 1, will be an influenza special. It is designed to cover comprehensively and detail what the individual should do, what the county should do, what the community should do, and what the State health authorities will do in the event the epidemic recurs. The State Board of Health bespeaks an extensive and careful reading of this bulletin. A heavy responsibility rests especially upon those States and local officials whose most urgent duty is to provide for the safety of health and life, we refer especially to the chairman of boards of county commissioners, who are the ex-official chairman of the board of health, and to the local health officers.

An average of seventy-five children a day examined and treated was the record established during the past week by the dentists conducting free dental clinics in eight counties under the direction of the State Board of Health. Nearly a thousand treatments were given during the week, which established a new record for efficiency in this line of work.

Gratifying results in the fight being waged against typhoid fever in North Carolina by the State Board of Health are shown in the number of cases reported for the past month. For that period there were 741 cases reported

as against over 900 for the same month last year.

The reports for the first half of August are still more encouraging.

For July general diseases again lead the list of diseases reported with a total of 752. Others for the month were as follows: typhoid fever 741, whooping cough 528, measles 212, smallpox 117, diphtheria 65, scarlet fever 44, septic sore throat 12, chickenpox 34, infant paralysis 3, epidemic meningitis 7, broncho-pneumonia 13, lobar pneumonia 9, cholera infantum 9, bacillary dysentery 23, amoebic dysentery 1, para-typhoid 9, ophthalmia neonatorum 3.
