Whitener Wants to Succeed Linney

Mr. A. A. Whitener, of Newton, Marion Butler's favorite, it is reported will oppose Frank A. Linney for the state chairmanship of the Republican party. It is reported that Butler is dissatisfied with the progress of the party in North Carolina under the guidance of the Taylorsville man, and that he will seek to replace him with Whitener in the 1920 race. It is also rumored that Morehead will seek Senator Simmons' place in the Senate of the United States, and that Judge Jeter C. Pritchard will continue to hold the federal bench. It is conceded by some of Morehead's strong supporters that Judge Pritchard is the most popular Republican aspirant in the state, but they put credit on his denial to oppose Overman, and they believe that Morehead will carry the most votes.
