



LETTER FROM U. S. ATTORNEY HAMMER

I am urgently requested and instruct of by the Attorney Gene al that this measure be vigorously enforced in this district.

Fair price committees in most count is alle fixing maximum mans for necessaries. These committees after careful investigation have profeshed fair prices on many of the necessaries where it was de med advisable. Prices tranged in excess of such publish d prices, the store, indicate were proble rates and changes. Prompt steps to be final such cases should be taken namediately which a view of instituting our small prosecution in cases wherein le facts are smile at to justify,

Fair Price commits examinate State, Municipal and Federal efficies, and persons interested in the wildness of the people are torgently invited and quested to co-operate in this cample on to reduce the cost of living.

Not only should every one work from whiche to whistle to aid in the nereasing production of the necessaries of life, but the strictest acomounty and careful purchasing the necessaries of life are equally important with aroductic, and that every effort should be made to prevent prefiteering, and to a tke it unpopular.

The Department of Justice is especially anxious to encourage a camaign to increase production and to decrease consumption; offset the "Buy " campaign propaganda to increase prices; assure and contince the people that not only the peak of prices have been reached in food and feed products, but that wearing apparel instead of going higher, must gradually becrease; convince the people that the Government means business and that profiteering and other violations of law will be rigidly enforced and intensively administered.

Prosecutions have been instituted and others will be instituted against those who are controlling prices and profiteering. The law prohibits unjust or unreasonable prices. This is a question to be determined by the court in any particular case. In ascertaining what is a reasonable charge, the riginal cost is one factor to be considered, the replacement value another, and all the facts and circumstances surrounding the transaction are proper elements entering into the problem. The Fair Price Committees must their best judgment in such cases, without narrowing the question to any one factor. The test should be original cost and not replacement value. An investigation in this district shows that some wholesalers are charging excessive profits and some retailers have advanced prices out of all reason, and are so possessed with the idea of greed that they have lost all sense of justice and fairness, that they unblushingly attempt to justify unreasonable margins of profit for various reasons, and will make no effort or promise to cut expenses so as to reduce prices. This is a class that deserves attention, first, for there is no store anywhere that cannot cut off some unnecessary peace somewhore, thereby making lower prices possible. That which is est al sired is to maintain fair prices.

Fair price committees are federal officers and have juri-diction to fix prices, including fuel, food, feed and wraning approvel.
