At the time of the accident Mr. Cox was alone in the house, his wife about five minutes be fore having gone to the barn to look after the cows. Mr. Cox had been in ill health for some time prior to his death, at times seeming morose, not

particularly sick, but having very little to say. The supposition is that he killed himself. Mr. Cox was one of the b_st and most conscientious citizens of the county. He was a son of the late William Cox. He married Miss Hattie Hinson, daughter of the late Manly Hinson, of Pleasant Grove township. To this union two sons were born, Carl E. and Claude E., both of whom with their mother survive. Mr. Cox is also survived by two brothers, Mr. H. C. Cox, of Asheboro Route 1, and E.

F. Cox, of Ramseur Route 1, and two sisters, Mrs. J. H. Cräven, of Frank-linville township, and Mrs. M. E. Allen, of Asheboro Route 1. The de-ceased was 52 years of age.
