Xmas Poesy Party

"A Garden of Flowers"—an ideal scene for a fancy Christmas dress party. When the invitations are sent out each guest should be requested to come to "the Garden of Flowers" dressed to represent a flower. Whatever flower is chosen should be intimated to the hostess when accepting the invitation. For the supper table decoration for this party, in the center stand a large doll dressed as a rose—the queen of flowers. In her hands should be fastened as many garlands of baby ribbons or strings of small blossoms as there are guests. Attach little gifts at the other ends of the garlands appropriate to the costumes of the guests that are to receive them, such as brooches and scarfpins with flowers in enamel baskets of sweets trimmed with flowers, or pretty cut glass bottles of perfume, decorated with blossoms. NOTICE OF BOND ISSUE

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$205,000 OF BONDS OF THE TOWN OF ASHEBORO, NORTH CAROLINA, FOR STREET IMPROVEMENTS.

Whereas, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 56 of the Public Laws of 1913 of North Carolina, as amended, constituting Article 9 of Chapter 56 of the Consolidated Statutes of North Carolina, the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Asheboro has determined to make the local improvements hereinafter described, and to assess a certain proportion of the cost thereof (in each case at least one-half) exclusive of the cost of paying at street intersections, upon the lots or parcels of land abutting directly on the improvements, and also determined to grant the owners of said property the option and privilege of paying such special assessments in ten equal annual installments; and

Whereas, the total cost of said improvements, as estimated by the Board of Commissioners will be \$205,000, and the portion of said cost to be assessed as aforesaid will, in the judgment of the Board of Commissioners, amount to at least \$96,000, and it is necessary to provide funds to pay said cost.

Now, Therefore, be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Asheboro, as follows:

Section 1. Pursuant to the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Sub-Chapter III of Chapter 56 of the Consolidated Statutes of North Carolina) bonds of the Town of Asheboro, to be known as Street Improvement Bonds, are hereby authorized to be issued in an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$205,000, for the purpose of constructing or reconstructing the surface of pavement of the following portions of streets in the Town of Asheboro, such surface or pavement to be of sheet asphalt, laid on a solid foundation, including contemporaneous construction or reconstruction of curbs, gutters and drains therein, and the grading thereof, viz:

Depot Street and Sunset Avenue, from Bank of Randolph to J. S. Lewis' west line;

North Street, from Fayetteville Street to Old Main Street;

Old Main Street, from Worth Street to Salisbury Street and Salisbury Street from Old Main Street to the street leading south from Salisbury Street between the lands of the McAlister estate on the east and Asheboro Hosley, Ben Wallace, Calvin Ferree and John Harrison on the west, intersecting with a continuation of Worth Street.

North Street, from Salisbury Street to Depot Street;

North Fayetteville Street, from Bank of Randolph to end of sewer line in North Asheboro;

South Fayetteville Street, from Bank of Randolph to where the Old Commerce Road leaves south Fayetteville Street;

Depot Street and Sunset Avenue from J. S. Lewis' west line of house lot to the west lines of G. H. King's and C. T. Hollis' lots;

Salisbury Street, from Fayetteville Street to G. W. Beale's corner;

Charon Street, from Depot Street to Salisbury Street.

Section 2. A tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of all the bonds hereby authorized shall be annually levied and collected.

Section 3. The following matters are hereby stated pursuant to the requirements of The Municipal Finance Act:

(a) A statement of the debt of the Town of Asheboro has been made and filed with the Town Clerk pursuant to The Municipal Finance Act and is open to public inspection.

(b) The assessed valuation of property subject to taxation by the Town of Asheboro for the year 1920, as shown by said statement, is \$3,054,963.00.

(c) The amount of the net debt of the Town of Asheboro outstanding, authorized or to be authorized, as shown by said statement, is \$173,004.

(d) All petitions required by law for the making of said street improvements and for the levying of special assessments therefor have heretofore been duly made.

(e) All expenses to be defrayed by means of the bonds hereby authorized are necessary expenses of the Town of Asheboro within the meaning of Section 7 of Article VII of the Constitution of North Carolina.

(f) The recitals in the preamble of this ordinance are true.

Section 4. The ordinance entitled "An Ordinance providing for the issuance of One hundred and fifty thousand dollars Local Improvement and Assessment Bonds of the Town of Asheboro, State of North Carolina, and for the payment of the principal thereof and interest thereon," adopted by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Asheboro on October 9, 1919, is hereby repealed, the bonds hereby authorized being intended to be issued instead of the bonds authorized by said ordinance. All temporary indebtedness heretofore incurred or notes heretofore issued, and all contracts heretofore let, for any of the improvements for which bonds are hereby authorized to be issued are hereby approved, ratified and confirmed, and such indebtedness and notes shall be deemed to have been incurred and issued in anticipation of the sale of the bonds hereby authorized.

Section 5. This ordinance shall be published once as required by The Municipal Finance Act.

Section 6. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage, and shall not be submitted to the voters of the Town.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 14th day of December, 1920, and was first published on the 16th day of December, 1920.

Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.
