OLD MAP OF ASHEBORO

The Courier is in receipt of an old map of Asheboro prepared by Joshua Craven early in 1826. It comes from Mr. D. T. McCain, of Back Creek township, who inherited it from his father. It is beautifully executed and shows pains-taking care and attention to details

It divides the town into 42 plats and of these seven seem to have belonged to Mr. Craven, two to a Mr. Brown, two to Mr. Elliott, one to Governor Worth, one to Mr. Harper, and one to Mr. Lane. The remaining plats are numbered but give no information as to ownership. It seems that the old court house street was then known as McCullogh Street.

This map is an interesting document, and we are glad of the privilege of looking it over.





The annual value of manufactured products is in excess of \$760,000,000.00. Cotton products, tobacco and fertilizers are the biggest contributors to the large total. Spindles number nearly six million, and looms nearly 73,000. To drive the machinery 128,823 horse power is necessary.
