State Piano Contest Date Fixed

Prof. Wade R. Brown, of the North Carolina College for Women Greensboro has announced that the annual State Piano contest will be held at the college May 6th.

The plan of the music competition has been greatly changed and enlarged this year, and there will be contests in piano playing, violin playing and singing by boys' and girls' glee clubs. These four events will add much interest to the May meeting. The competition is open to all high school students of the state, winners in each county havin gthe privilege of coming to Greensboro to participate in the finals.

The state piano contest has been an established institution for the past two years. In 1920, 12 counties sent students to take part in the contest. Last year 23 counties participated. It is expected this year that fully half of the counties in the state will have representatives there.

Mr. Frazier is also survived by 34 grandchildren and three great grandchildren.

The funeral was conducted at Gray's chapel, Sunday by Rev. B. G. Whitley, of Greensboro. Interment followed in the church graveyard.
