FINAL DEBATE AT CHAPEL HILL IN APRIL

The final contest for the Aycock Memorial Cup will be held at the University on April 6 and 7. All high schools which won both of their triangular debates this week will send their teams to compete in the final contest. The Aycock Cup has been won in the past by Pleasant Garden, Winston-Salem, Wilson twice, Graham, Waynesville, Durham twice, and Asheboro.

The annual triangular debating contests were begun in the State ten years ago. They were taken up in the first instance by the Di and Phi literary societies at the suggestion of C. E. McIntosh, of the University class of 1911. Since that time, the movement has become very popular in North Carolina and has spread into a number of other southern states, notably Kentucky, South Carolina, Virginia, Alabama, and Mississippi.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION IN CHARLOTTE APRIL 11-13

Many Sunday School leaders of North Carolina are on the program for the state Sunday School convention which will be in session in Charlotte, April 11-13.

One outstanding feature of the program will be a parade of Sunday school men on the last evening of the convention.

Another attractive feature of the convention will be the pageant on religious education, "The Lamp," which will be presented the last night, April 13, by the Sunday schools of Charlotte. The convention theme is "Religious Education in the Home, the Church, the Community," and the pageant will be the climax to the programs presented at the previous sessions.

Another feature of the convention which is expected to be most helpful is the divisional conferences on the afternoons of April 12 and 13, at which time the convention will divide into four sections for the children's, young peoples', adult and administrative division workers.

Communications are being sent out by the Charlotte committee on arrangements assuring the church and Sunday school workers of the state that Charlotte can take care of all who attend the convention, for besides the hotel accommodations the committee has secured lodging and breakfast (Harvard plan) at the rate of \$1.00 per night for the delegates in the private homes of the city.

The local committee will meet all trains during the convention. All delegates will be registered and assigned homes at the First Presbyterian Church, which will be the convention church.

Railroads of the state have granted a special rate of one and one-half fare, certificate plan, provided as many as 350 certificates are presented for validation.

Information is being received indicating a large number of workers over the state are planning to make the trip to the convention in automobiles.

SOUTHERN CONGRESSMEN URGED TO SUPPORT SUBSIDY

In an address last week in the Senate, Senator Ransdell, of Louisiana urged Southern Congressman to support legislation providing aid from the government for the Merchant Marine.

Such aid, he declared, was absolutely essential if business men were to be expected to invest capital in the shipping business. It will be impossible for the Shipping Board to dispose of its very large fleet of slow, moderate sized vessels. With a little assistance these vessels may be operated from a number of smaller ports of America with fair success, thereby establishing business out of these ports to the great benefit of the country generally. For the export of cotton, lumber, tobacco and other bulky commodities, extra ships are necessary, and to keep them in commission the government must extend assistance. The South needs a Merchant Marine.
