LEXINGTON MAN RECEIVES CHECK DUE 33 YEARS AGO. Capt. C. W. Trice, of Lexington, received a check last week from a man who had owed him a board bill for thirty-three years and who had the matter recalled to his mind by reading in the state press about the unveiling of the soldier monument, in which Capt. Trice took part. Upon reading the item the man who now lives near Durham, wrote Captain Trice and inquired about men and things he was familiar with when he lived in Lexington, and said he was still interested in the city. Captain Trice replied and received in return a letter with the check enclosed. It was the balance due on a board bill which the writer was unable to pay in full at the time he left here a third century ago. Capturing a Still. Mr. D. R. Bulla, of Sophia, writes The Courier of his experience in capturing a still, which will be of interest to our readers: On Wednesday, July 5, I had my first experience hunting for and finding a still. Sheriff Brady, Mr. Jenkins, Mr. Lemonds and I were in most of the rain July 4 searching, but we were unable to locate it. Deputy Sheriff John M. Spencer and I resumed the search Wednesday. I was alone when I found the still, and I will admit that while on the hot trail leading from the small stream where the men (should they be called men?) I hesitate to do so) had gotten their water I felt the skin draw tight on my head, tight enough perhaps to make the hair stand. Why? Because men who would be murderers in one way might be in another. It is a case parallel to the one Dr. L. B. McBrayer, superintendent of the State Sanatorium for the treatment of tuberculosis has in mind when he says: "Any man who knowingly and wilfully spreads the germs of disease to his fellowman is a murderer, yes, slowly but surely a murderer." These men are murderers, guilty of spreading to their fellowmen the germs of trouble, sorrow, crime, accident and of death. Guilty of over nine tenths of the crimes, guilty of over nine tenths of the accidents. I wonder when the final reckoning of their lives come; when the crimes have been numbered and weighed and the toll of lives summed up, how many gallons at \$4.00 or even \$15.00 it will take to pay the debt they owe. We are helping these men carry on their destructive work as we are helping: First, crippled humanity (these men are included) to crawl from the debris and wreckage of their brain of life which has fallen into the ditch; and secondly, we are helping young men of this generation and of every generation to come to not board this train which has so many wrecks and causes the death of so many lives. It may be of interest to know that this still was found on the Mrs. Ella Johnson place which I have in charge. With it were three barrels, two boxes, two kegs, one tub, several buckets, one lard can, one bag meal, about 300 gallons of beer, and two gallons of liquor. The still was filled ready for operation. It is a shame that men who have been placed in the garden of this world with the privilege of pruning and making of it what they will and given life to make of it what they will, will choose that which destroys the beautifulness of the world and even life itself. 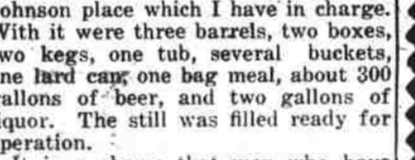
