Into a legislative situation already profoundly disturbed with political and economic questions, Senator Underwood, Alabama, Democratic leader in the Senate, recently injected another troublesome question—the settlement of American war claims against the German government and its subjects. Stating that he had waited in vain for the party in power to take up the task of satisfying the claims of Americans whose relatives were killed in the sinking of the Lusitania, or who otherwise suffered from German depredation, Underwood introduced a bill providing a comprehensive method for dealing with the subject of alien property. Favors Naming Commission. It called for an All-American commission of six, selected by the President and confirmed by the Senate. No German or other foreign representatives under Underwood's plan, would have any voice in arranging for settlement of the claims. The elemental principle of his plan is the use of the German property now in the hands of the alien property custodian, to satisfy American claims. The procedure laid down for the commission is, first, the adjudication of American claims, which, according to Underwood, total \$1,000,000,000 but probably would be reduced finally to about \$400,000,000. Second, the commission would classify German property now in this government's possession. Property of the German government would be in one class; industrial property of German nationals in another; securities in another, and so on. Then, "unless otherwise satisfied" the allowed claims of Americans would be paid out of the various classes, beginning with the German government property. The belongings of German subjects would not be used until their government's holdings were exhausted. The American claimants also would be classified according to the time, manner, nature and degree of the loss or damage sustained, so that those most entitled to recover should be first taken care of. Question Right to Seize. The Alabama Senator warned that unless something was done soon, the German property now held would not be sufficient to meet the claims, because of the rapidity with which claims have been allowed. His action brought on a discussion of the government's right to confiscate seized enemy property for the purpose of satisfying American claims, Senators Borah, Wash (Mont.), and King expressing the view that this government was merely a trustee and had no right to confiscate the property. 666 quickly relieves Colds, Constipation, Biliousness and Headaches.
