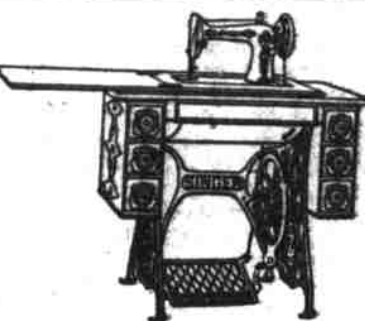

Prominent Doctor Dead.

Dr. Karl von Ruck, internationally known authority on treatment and prevention of tuberculosis, died Sunday at his residence in Asheville after an illness of several weeks. His death marks the passing of one of the outstanding persons in the history of tuberculosis study in America. After his wide course of study at several colleges and universities, he practiced in Ohio, later locating at Asheville where he founded the Winyth sanatorium in 1888, which bears the distinction of being among the first institutions for the treatment of tuberculosis.
