DON'TS FOR DAIRY FARMERS

- Don't forget to wipe the cow's udder and flanks before milking. Don't milk with wet hands. Don't run cold milk through the separator. Don't forget to cool the cream immediately after separation is completed. Don't mix warm and cool cream. Don't forget to wash the separator after each separation. Don't separate the milk without first straining it. Don't fail to operate the separator according to directions. Don't feed dusty hay or ill-smelling feeds just before milking. Don't expect the milk or cream to be cooler than the surroundings where it is kept. Don't skim too thin cream. Don't expect to get top price for cream unless cows, stable, utensils, separator, and milkers are kept clean. Don't forget that there is good money in dairying if it is properly done.

Start cultivating with a light weeder or rake of some kind, even before the seed have come up, or certainly as soon as the young plants can be seen. This is important to destroy a crop of weeds and allow the young vegetable plants to get started ahead of them. Do not neglect this. When the plants are larger, other implements, even horsepower machinery, may be used in cultivating. The soil should be stirred as often as every ten days if moisture conditions permit. The important thing in cultivation is to keep the soil loose on top, to keep down weeds, to retain moisture, and to admit air into the soil. Do not plant all of the garden at once, unless it is a small one. It is better to have it large enough so that several plantings of each vegetable may be made from two to three weeks apart, thus giving a succession of them throughout the season, instead of just one crop of each. Another good plan by way of intensive work is to plant rows of other things between the rows already planted, so that the soil may be occupied continually, one crop coming in while the other is going out. Still another good plan is to plant winter growing crops between the rows of summer crops, thus utilizing the soil with winter and summer. Every family should plant not less than six of the following standard vegetables in the spring and as many more as can be used to advantage for eating raw, cooking, canning, drying or other purposes: Asparagus, snap and lima beans, beets, cabbage, collards, carrot, egg plant, lettuce, mustard, okra, onion sets or seeds, potatoes, peppers, radishes, spinach, squash and tomatoes.

WHEN TO PLOW UNDER RYE AND CLOVER

A general rule that may be followed in plowing down green manure crops is to turn them under when they are in full bloom. Modifications of this rule are: (1) When the growth is heavy and rank, plow down earlier. (2) If light, plow a little later than when in full bloom. (3) Adjust the time of plowing down to the time of planting the next crop. Plow down the cover crop far enough in advance to be sure that a good seedbed is made. Crimson clover is very easily plowed down and rots quickly--too quickly in fact. Unless in a hurry to prepare the next crop, crimson clover may to advantage be plowed down when the blossoms begin to fade. Rye is at its best stage for plowing down when it first begins to head and should be plowed then unless there is a special reason for plowing down earlier or later. Far better seed beds will be made and better mixing of the green manure crop with the soil will come from thorough disking just before plowing. Run the disk the same way the breaking plow will go and the rye will be covered better. If a rank growth of rye is to be plowed down and it is desirable that it rot quickly, apply broadcast 200 to 400 pounds of acid phosphate before disking, then disk, follow with turnplow, and run drag harrow behind the turnplow.--The Progressive Farmer.

SELL PIGS NEXT SEPTEMBER

An average of hog prices by months during the last 23 years shows the highest prices for pigs. The average differences during that month and the month of December is \$1.53 per hundred pounds for similar hogs and it is believed that this difference is a good reason for pushing the Spring farrowed pigs for sale about September 1. Pigs properly handled and fed before September nearly always show a profit.
