MEETING OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

Meeting of the Board, Monday the 18th day of June, 1923.

The Board of County Commissioners met at 8 o'clock, a. m., on the date above named, in regular session, present, Messrs. L. M. Kearns, H. B. Leach, E. B. Leach, and C. C. Crawford, Mr. C. C. Crawford was unanimously chosen to sit, preside, and conduct the meeting as acting chairman. Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

Statements by the several county officers of fees received during the month of May, 1923, were received, approved and filed, as follows:

Petition presented from citizens of Hawk Creek township, and others requesting better road facilities from Caraway bridge to Caraway mill. The matter is referred to a committee composed of Messrs. E. B. Leach and J. C. Kirkman, which committee is to investigate and requested to report its findings.

Complaint is filed to the effect that the road from Coleridge to the Calvin Moffitt place has been obstructed by William Moffitt. The matter is referred to J. C. Kirkman, Road Supervisor, with instructions to look into and remedy the trouble in accordance with law.

Petition of citizens of Richland, Coleridge and Grant townships, for road from near Aaron Craven's store to the gravel road at J. A. Craven's, near S. R. Richardson's store, a distance of about four miles. The Road Supervisor is hereby instructed to pull up this piece of road, at such time as his force is at or near this point, and put in proper condition for top-solling; citizens to top-soll same.

It is ordered that a tank or cistern be installed beneath the water in the well in the court house front yard, for the purpose of cooling and making the water drinkable; that couplings or pipings be attached so as to make the same into a drinking fountain, using the city water for the purpose, and that H. M. Worth is hereby appointed for the purpose of having said fountain installed, and the present well curb be changed to a more presentable appearance.

The committee of this board appointed for the purpose of purchasing new road machines, reported that it had contracted for sixteen Premier Road Maintainers, from the manufacturers, the Gallon Iron Works and Mfg. Co., of Gallon, Ohio, at price of \$170.00 each. The action of the committee is hereby approved, and the clerk to this board is hereby directed to confirm the said contract, advising the said company of the confirmation and order the said machines shipped as quickly as possible.

A large delegation of citizens appeared before the Board in behalf of a campaign in the matter of cattle tuberculosis. In association with State and Government. Addresses were made, strongly advocating the acceptance of the contract offered by the State and Government, by Messrs. Wm. C. Hammer, J. F. Craven, E. C. Watkins, E. B. Leonard, Joseph D. Ross, Clifford N. Cox and W. D. Scarborough, to eradicate tuberculosis in cattle from the County of Randolph at the cost of approximately three thousand dollars. Final action in the matter is postponed to the next regular session of the Board.

The chairman of the Board, Mr. J. T. Weaver, appeared following the noon recess, and presided and participated in the transaction of business thereafter until adjournment.

The resignation of W. E. Hardister, written and presented to the board in person by Mr. Hardister, as Registrar of the election called for Special Tax for schools and for bond issue in Concord, Cedar Grove and New Hope townships, said election to be held on the 18th day of June, 1923 at Farmer. Mr. Hardister, after persuasion, persisted and insisted upon resigning, and thereupon, upon suggestion of citizens of the said territory, C. R. Dorsett is nominated and is hereby appointed, vice the said W. E. Hardister, resigned, as Registrar for the said election.

Messrs. C. C. Crawford and E. B. Leach hereby are appointed as committee to examine into the matter of building a bridge across a branch near Coleridge, the precise location of which is known to the said committee, and the committee is hereby empowered to close contract for the said construction and have the bridge built at its discretion.

It is ordered that Tom Cox be paid when the work is completed, the sum of seventy five dollars (\$75.00) for building and placing a bridge upon the place now already built at a point on Mill Creek, and the said Tom Cox is hereby authorized and directed to purchase the necessary lumber for the said work at a cost not in excess of thirty dollars (\$30.00) per thousand feet.

It is ordered that Lydia Matthews, an indigent colored woman, of Seagrove, Route 1, be placed upon the permanent Outside poor list, and awarded two dollars (\$2.00) per month, until further ordered.

In the matter of License Tax, under schedule B of the Revenue Act of 1922, against the liability of the regular license in 1923, it is ordered that it be every return where a trade or business is carried on, and the license tax is not paid, that the same be assessed at the rate of 100 per cent of the regular license tax.

By virtue of an order of the Superior Court of Randolph County, in the Special Proceeding entitled Wm. Lewallen et al, vs Emma Foster, et al, I will on the 14th day of July, 1923, at 2 o'clock P.
