Portuguese Government Confers Insignia on 120th Infantry

Congressman Hammer has received the following letter from Metz, which contains information of local and general interest: Hon. William C. Hammer, MC, Washington, D. C.

The Portuguese Government has conferred the insignia of the grade of Chevalier, Portuguese Order of "Torre e Espada" (Tower and Sword), upon the colors of the 120th Infantry, which was a part of the 80th Division, United States Army, and served overseas during the World War.

HOW LIST TAKERS CAN GET ALL THE LAND ON THE TAX BOOKS THIS YEAR

A most important law is Chapter 62 of the extra session of the General Assembly of 1920.

All list takers are required to examine the record of transfers in the office of Register of Deeds so that they may get all the real estate on the tax books and in the name of the proper owner.

This is the second year this law has been on the tax books and our information is the tax listers last year and this year have not performed their duty as to the matter.

Owners of many tracts of land in the different townships are paying no tax on lands recently purchased. In many instances lands sold recently by former Sheriff Brady were in the name of the former owner, and in some instances the present owner had listed and paid the taxes.

The law is as follows: Section 3 of chapter 62 Public Laws of extra session of 1920.

It shall be the duty of register of deeds in each of the several counties in the State for the purpose of providing a convenient and accurate record of all transfers of real property, to the end that all real property now on the tax books shall be kept on the books at all times charged to the owners of such property in each year, to keep an accurate record, upon forms prescribed by the State Tax Commission, of each and every transfer of real property, which records shall contain a statement of grantor and grantees, actual consideration; number of acres if a tract of land, or size of lot if a town lot; an accurate description of the property and its location, not necessarily metes and bounds, but in such terms as will give to the list takers accurate information as to its location; description, if it represents a subdivision or a part of former tract etc.
