TO THE TAX PAYERS OF RANDOLPH COUNTY

Resolution adopted by the Board of County Commissioners at its meeting on July 2nd, 1923, and printed for the information and benefit of the public: WHEREAS, a large amount of property, both real and personal, has not been listed with the several List Takers of the various townships, and it is hereby ordered, that on and after the first day of August, 1923, all property, both real and personal, that may be presented for the purpose of being listed, or discovered by the Tax Supervisor as being then unlisted, shall be subject to the addition of five per centum of the regular amount of tax due, and in addition thereto the sum of twenty five cents, (25c) payable to the Clerk to the Board for writing the delinquent list, shall be collected by the said Clerk, and returned to the General Fund of the County.

ENFORCING OUR DRY LAWS

Some Foreigners Don't Like Them—Lloyd George Says America Has Right to Seize Liquor

Thousands of gallons of intoxicating liquors are being seized and confiscated by government agents in New York harbor. Foreign lines who come from "wet" countries bring with them supplies of drink for the return voyages only to lose these drinks to United States officers, who are trying to enforce our prohibition laws.

Many newspapers and individuals in England are saying that American authorities lack the right to seize British liquor stores aboard ships. However, Lloyd George, addressing a large crowd in the Welsh Baptist church, in London, declared that, in his opinion, America has a right to seize liquor on foreign vessels. He further declared that this country is making an "experiment to deal with probably the greatest curse of modern civilization," and that it is in the interest of civilization that our prohibition laws be given a fair test.
