Diplomatic relations have been restored between the United States and Mexico through the efforts of J. B. Payne and C. R. Warren. C. B. Greager, of Texas, is expected to be the Mexican ambassador instead of Marion Butler, of North Carolina, who is an aspirant for the place.

The Marine Corps of the United States have furnished the cloth for the next uniforms of the U. S. Marines and have saved \$180,000 in the purchase of the khaki cloth abroad. Other consumers do not have the same privilege because of protective tariff.

The low temperature of August 23 and the day before and thereafter did not continue and the accustomed weather of this time of year has prevailed since that date. The coldest August weather records show the twenty-third and twenty-fourth were the lowest known within the memory of man.

A few weeks ago the Courier erroneously stated that the Junior Order of American Mechanics had decided upon Raleigh for the location of the orphanage which will be built in North Carolina this year. GOOD NEWS

The Manufacturers Record says that North Carolina most nearly produces the farm products that farmers need than any other state in the union. Following this the showing made by the state, according to State Superintendent of Public Instruction report that 6,500 boys and girls graduated from the high schools of North Carolina this year as against 1,500 four years ago.

At the meeting of the City Ministers' Association last Monday it was decided that "go to church Sunday" would be observed next Sunday. The news which comes from Yadkin county is distressing. Former Sheriff of that county, A. R. Lackey, had domestic troubles and his family had run him off and he was living in a little pine slab cabin with a ground floor. He was a member of the grand jury two weeks ago and on Monday night when he went home he never came back and he was found dead sometime next day in his pine slab cabin with a shot gun so located as to leave the impression that he committed suicide. Examination of the wound shows it was impossible for him to commit suicide. His son it is alleged is a very bad man and was afraid that his father would tell what he knew on him before the grand jury and it is alleged that this son committed the crime to hush his father's mouth. Sheriff Lackey had another son several years ago who was sentenced to the chain gang for larceny.

MISTRIAL IN GARRETT MURDER CASE

In the case of R. O. Garrett, who was tried last week in the superior court of Amherst county, Virginia, on the charge of murder of Rev. E. S. Pierce, a well known Baptist minister of that county, the jury failed to agree and a new trial of the case was ordered by Judge White, presiding. This is the second time the case has been tried.

In the second trial, the jury deliberated for three hours. It was stated at the outset one juror stood for first degree murder, seven for second degree murder, one for manslaughter, and one for acquittal.

Mr. Garrett is Clerk of the Court of Cumberland county, and it is alleged that he shot the minister in self defense. The retrial of the case is set for the September term of the court.
