In the case of R. O. Garrett, who was tried last week in the superior court of Amherst county, Virginia, on the charge of murder of Rev. E. S. Pierce, a well known Baptist min-ister of that county, the jury failed to agree and a new trial of the case was ordered by Judge White, presiding. This is the second time the case

In the second trial, the jury destated at the outset one juror stood for first degree murder, seven for second degree murder, one for man-slaughter, and one for acquittal.
