Crowns were not to be used for the purpose of keeping uncombed hair off the eyes, originally made of flowers and plants they were called garlands. The first crown of a king was made of oak leaves and berries but these in time were changed to gold.

The olive crown was made of oak leaves and was given to a soldier who in battle saved the life of a Roman citizen. The camp crown, made of gold, was given to him who first entered the enemy's camp; the naval crown to him who first boarded an enemy's ship. To him who gained a victory over pirates on the high seas was presented a crown of myrtle.

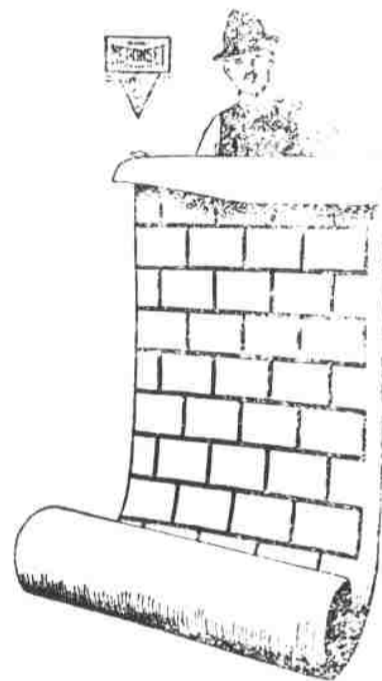
